Gamma Iota Demonstrates Excellence on All Levels

Alumni Involvement Generates \$112,000 for Mom Abbott, Awards Academic Scholarships

t's been a very busy year for Gamma Iota. I want to start by thanking all of our amazing alumni for really stepping up financially in 2016. A year ago, we were walking out of our annual offsite weekend on the Texas coast with a long list of topics/issues that needed to be accomplished, and I think we checked almost every one of them off the list or at least started preparing a long-term plan. We heard from the chapter on the competitiveness of the Shelter compared to other fraternities on West Campus. In response, the Alumni Association is working to develop a long-term plan for transforming the Shelter by retaining the services of a national consulting company and Jay Corder '94, who volunteered his time to prepare architectural plans/renderings. We heard the chapter on the need to support recruitment and the alumni raised \$37,000 to supplement the chapter budget. The alumni and some parents and friends generously supported our beloved housemother, Mom Abbott, with a substantial retirement gift. Having this alumni involvement the past year has demonstrated to the chapter that the alumni are a very impressive driving force for Gamma Iota—something that as an undergraduate, many of us probably did not appreciate or understand.

The chapter has also done its part. They successfully transitioned taking over the dayto-day maintenance of the Shelter from Mom Abbott—a huge thanks to House Manager Jeremy Martens '18 for working tirelessly with Scott Benkendorfer '90, Bill McMeans '80, and Russell Douglass '81 on the \$85,000 worth of improvements that were made this past year to the Shelter, in addition to keeping the trains running on time for regular maintenance. I told you in the fall that the chapter had recruited a solid 43 pledges. In the fall, when I reported this, we didn't know for sure how good they were and I was a little disappointed in the number—the target was 50. But based on the feedback from the officer retreat, there have been multiple reports from sorority women on campus and

even some other top fraternities admitting that the Delt pledge class is the BEST on campus. That makes me proud and I know the money we raised helped the chapter be successful and the recruitment captains did their job. I'm also really proud of the culture shift in supporting legacies. We had eight legacies in the fall pledge class—four were father-son. At the offsite in January, the chapter president, recruitment coordinator, and alumni relations officers were all father-son legacies. This was unheard of in the '90s when I was in school.

The weekend of January 28-29 we had our seventh annual alumni/chapter officer offsite at Falcon Point Ranch in Seadrift, Texas. We had 20 alumni and 23 officers in attendance—the most ever for alumni and officers. I've included a summary of the weekend on page 2; this was the best one yet. We covered a ton of ground, we now have officers who attended this event seven years ago and more recently wanting to come back, and we continue to introduce new alumni to the weekend who say they are amazed at the quality of the officer group and men in the chapter now. Gamma Iota has momentum. Our alumni are energized and the chapter is in a very good spot.

We need to stay focused. This year needs to be another strong recruitment year. All of the recruitment captains were at the offsite. Kyle Varni '18, who is a legacy, is the recruitment coordinator this year and manages the six recruitment captains and the additional six area recruitment captains. He has big shoes to fill and we need your help. We need to raise another \$35,000-\$40,000 this year for recruitment. We already have the support of Steve Stodghill '83 again, stepping up big both financially as well as hosting a barbecue at his house the weekend of Dallas state last summer. OFFSITE EXPERIENCE LEAVES MEMORABLE IMPRESSION ON ALUMNI AND UNDERGRADUATE OFFICERS

The weekend of January 28-29 was the seventh annual alumni/officer offsite at Falcon Point Ranch. It was the best one yetwe had 20 alumni and 23 chapter officers in attendance. We discussed the status of Gamma Iota on campus, recruitment, how recruitment funds were spent this past year, what worked and didn't work with recruitment, risk management, and an update on the Shelter improvements and planning for larger-scale projects down the road. It has now been about 15 years since the last renovation, and the Shelter is in serious need of upgrades, primarily due to age and normal wear-and-tear. The \$85,000 of improvements this past year were greatly needed and should be sufficient while we undergo the planning for the larger project. Additionally, the chapter updated us on the activity in West Campus with the aggressive remodeling, rebuilding, and new building trend with other fraternities.

I'm sure anyone who was in the Shelter last fall noticed the improvements, including a complete upgrade to the open courtyard, all new furnishings, tables and chairs, refreshed paint throughout the interior and exterior of the Shelter, cleaned and polished floors, and new TVs. Additionally, the Alumni Association retained a consulting firm and architect to begin thinking about long-term options for 2801 San Jacinto. This work has been ongoing since April/May, and hopefully we will have updates to share with the broader alumni group in the coming weeks and months. 

ALUMNI UPDATE

CHAPTER ETERNAL

Earl J. Brewer, M.D. '49 entered Chapter Eternal on March 19, 2015. He was a pioneer of pediatric rheumatology locally, nationally, and internationally. He founded and was chairman of the pediatric department of Kelsey Seybold Clinic for 22 years; founded and was chairman of the Rheumatology Section and Division at Texas Children's Hospital and Baylor College of Medicine for 30 years; and was also a clinical professor at Baylor. Earl was a prolific writer and authored many medical papers and several medical, nonfiction, and fiction books. As founder and chairman of the Pediatric Rheumatology Collaborative Study Group, he directed over 15 multicenter studies of anti-arthritis medicines, resulting in approval of several new drugs by the FDA.

Wilbur P. Cunningham '58 entered Chapter Eternal on June 6, 2016, as a resident of Big Spring, Texas. Wilbur enlisted in the Army National Guard in February 1959, and was called into active duty during the Cuban Missile Crisis. He was honorably discharged in 1962. After graduating from UT, Wilbur began a 36-year teaching career in Big Spring ISD as a sixth-grade teacher, high school math teacher, and golf coach. Wilbur influenced thousands of students throughout his illustrious career. He is survived by his wife, Donnita; son, Dale; nieces, Cherri, Linda, and Susan; nephew, Robert; and numerous great-nieces and great-nephews.

Frederick E. Westmoreland '76 entered Chapter Eternal on January 6, 2016, after a battle with brain cancer. He lived in Midland, Texas, with his wife, Debra.

Alfred J. "Chip" Bacon Jr. '01 entered Chapter Eternal on October 15, 2015, as a resident of McQueeney, Texas. He will be remembered as a terrific water skier. At ages 12, 14, and 16, Chip qualified to compete in the United States National Water Ski Championships. As a member of the Lake Mc Queeney Ski Bees, he participated in the weekly ski shows and was also a member of the Ski Bee show team that won a regional championship at Sea World in San Antonio. He was one of the top salesmen in his division at the Fastenal Company. He is survived by his son, Austin; parents, Al and Debbie; brothers, Derrick and Brian; nieces, Caitlyn and Addisyn; grandmother, Helen; cousins, Todd, Holly, and Clint; former wife, Vanessa; and many friends.

any brothers, including Brandon Boehme '86, reflect on their decision to join Delta Tau Delta as one of the best decisions they have ever made. "I joined the Delts because I wanted to be involved in what was going on at UT, and the fraternity seemed to be the best vehicle for getting into the social scene," Brandon says. "Most of the guys from my high school were Delts and I really never considered any other fraternities. I have never regretted my time at the Shelter or the friendships I started there. Being part of Gamma Iota has been one of the most rewarding experiences in my life."

Brandon was a zealous member from the start and desired to become a leader in Gamma Iota. He served as pledge class social chairman, along with Bill Cox

'86, and they both went on to serve as chapter social chairman. Later on, Brandon was elected as alumni relations chairman and vice president. Brandon's remarkable leadership allowed him to branch out and form valuable connections with brothers, many of which have remained intact to this day. "I may not see or talk to a lot of the guys for years at a time, but once we cross paths again, we pick right up where we left off. I am always amazed at how some of the wildest, most irresponsible human beings I have ever been around, myself included, turned out to be doctors, surgeons, lawyers, entrepreneurs, business owners, and highly skilled employees doing incredible work across the U.S. and abroad."

A loyal Longhorn, Brandon makes it a goal to visit UT a few times each year for football games, spend time with family and relatives, and stop by the Shelter to interact with the active brothers. He says, "I wish more Delts would get involved with supporting our chapter and giving back to the young men who are there now. I look around campus and see how so many other fraternities have new, state-of-the-art houses, and I want the Delts to stay competitive so they will be around for generations to come."

After graduating from UT, Brandon attended law school at Baylor and worked as an attorney at Shannon, Gracey, Ratliff, and Miller in Fort Worth, Texas, in 1989, where he practiced for 25 years before retiring in 2013. He has lived and practiced in Fort Worth ever since. "While Austin is a wonderful place, where all my family still lives, I could not have picked a better place to call 'home' than Fort Worth," he says.

Brandon and his wife, Cindy, who is a Texas Tech University graduate, enjoy being active in the Fort Worth community. "Like so many of my Delt brothers, I married way above myself," Brandon says. "Cindy was in retail for many years and even had her own store for a while, but the last couple of years she has been a flight attendant for American Airlines, which has also greatly increased our travel adventures. We have no children, but it has allowed us to pour into the lives of hundreds of children in Brazil and around the world through our non-profit, so we consider ourselves to be the parents of them all!"

Although Brandon no longer practices law, he continues to consult and mentor young attorneys. Brandon and Cindy spend a lot of time in Brazil and Ecuador, where they have a second home. "I make sure I am always in Texas November through February for quail season, and I have a couple of German shorthaired pointers I like to chase all over West Texas," Brandon jokes. "The rest of my time is spent with other men who lift me up and encourage me to keep pursuing Christ. I want to help as many people as I can to be the best they can be, and find the happiness and peace I have found in pursuing a life of service to others." 

In 2016, we collected generous donations totaling \$20,775 to the Texas Delts Alumni Association while another \$112,000 was raised for Judy Abbott's retirement gift. Thank you to **Scott Benkendorfer '90** for his hard work leading this effort to success. Without him, this campaign would not have been as successful as it was. Both sets of donors are summarized in the newsletter by giving level. Several donors elected to remain anonymous and we have respected that decision.
